

Celebrating 60 years of Spaceflight Sputnik 1

The launch of Sputnik 1 on 4th October 1957, Earth's first artificial satellite, paved the way for Moonwalking astronauts, robotic exploration of the planets, and space tourism

Celebrating the 70th anniversary of Supersonic Flight 14th October 1947

Charles Elwood "Chuck" Yeager became the first pilot confirmed to have exceeded the speed of sound in level flight. After the war, Yeager became a test pilot of many different aircraft types, including the rocket powered Bell X-1 (Picture opposite) in which succeeded to fly greater than Mach 1



Mapping the Far Side of our Galaxy

Astronomers have started mapping the far side of the galaxy. In about 10 years time we could have a detailed map available.

It's difficult to observe anything on that side of the galaxy because of the dense, frenetic swarm of dust and gas at its centre. Scientists got around this by looking at a jet of radio waves that can outshine any emissions coming from that mess of stars.

To do this, they used parallax measurements, which take into account differences in measurements from two points in space. If you hold a finger up at arm's length and close one eye, then the other, your finger will appear to move over slightly — that small discrepancy is called parallax.

There will be no meeting at our usual venue at Prestwick Academy.


Please arrive at the SDSO for 7pm sharp with attire suitable for the location. NO WHITE LIGHT TORCHES!!!!!

- 3. Continue and cross the small bridge go straight on
- 4. At the cross roads turn left and follow the winding road up to the Observatory
- 5. Park in the car park and go into the reception/meeting room
